AAUW National Election – Why Should I Vote?

AAUW National changed from voting by delegates at conventions to one-member-one-vote several years ago. Thus each member has a responsibility for the management of the organization should she choose to exercise it.

This election starts on April 15 and ends on June 19. There are three parts:

- Approval of changes to the Public Policy principles
- Election of officers and board members
- Approval of bylaw changes.**

All the information you need to learn about these proposed changes and the officer candidates is in the Spring/Summer 2015 issue of the <u>Outlook</u> magazine that started arriving in the mail at the end of March.

This is an online vote process, and by now each member should have received an e-mail reminding her that it's time to vote, and facilitating this process with a single click. This is the first time for this e-mail process, so there may be hiccups. On the back of <u>Outlook</u> you will find your member number and a voter PIN which you may use if the e-mail from <u>AAUW.org</u> is somehow not effective or, if your e-mail address is incorrect at the National office, you may not receive the notice.

**One bylaw change proposal is truly significant this year. It will, if successful, eliminate all college degree requirements for membership. Consider this change, discuss it with other members, and be sure to vote your preference.

Membership Renewal FY 2015-2016 July 1, 2015 through June 30, 2016

It is time to renew your membership for the next year, beginning July 1, 2015. Dues are **\$85** annually



are \$85 annually (of which \$49 goes to national membership, \$9 goes to AZ state membership, and \$27 goes to AAUW-Prescott. \$46 of our national dues is tax deductible.)

The deadline

for renewal is June 30, 2015.

There are two options available to you for paying your dues. One is to pay them 'online' using your credit card and the other is writing a check to be sent to the Treasurer. National has improved the 'online' version considerably (removing the requirement of knowing your member number and password). Therefore, all of you will be receiving an e-mail with an 'invoice' for your dues shortly. The e-mail will still give you the option of paying using your credit card, OR sending our Treasurer a check for the \$85.

When you receive the e-mail 'invoice,' if you want to elect to pay online, simply click <u>here</u>. (No longer needing to go to the website with member ID and password and no need to access the MSD!)

If, however, you still prefer to pay by check, or have already done so, simply ignore the e-mail 'invoice,' and write the check for **§85** payable to **AAUW Prescott** (the breakdown information about how much of the \$85 goes to National/State/Branch is simply for your information).

At our March Public Policy Meeting the committee had a presentation from Desiree Perez, AAUW Prescott member and Planned Parenthood Regional Health Coordinator. Desiree provided an update on



Arizona legislation affecting women's health care and gave us information regarding her role in the community of Prescott. She welcomes calls and questions from members who would like to help and be involved in health issues for women.

In April the Public Policy Committee met to review current issues and to discuss and plan for the coming year. The April meeting began with an overview of what Public Policy Prescott has done and been involved with during this membership year. Highlights have included bringing candidates for Superintendent of Public Instruction to Prescott for a forum in October; examining the Women & Diversity issue at the college level with a presentation by Melanie Wilson, a branch member from ERAU; attending AZ Legislative Day in February; and efforts to revitalize and bring Smart Start to a college site in Prescott. The committee discussed and noted items that came up at our March Neighborhood Meetings. A plan to make Public Policy more visible and available at monthly General Meetings will be developed. All agreed that increasing member awareness of Public Policy is a priority, and the committee will look at meetings and topics suggested through the Neighborhood Meetings.

The May Public Policy Meeting will take place on Tuesday, May 5 at 1:00 pm in the Founders Room at Prescott Public Library. The topic for May is *The Prescott General Plan* with presenter Lindsey Bell. This meeting is open to all branch members, as is every meeting of Public Policy.

Equal Pay Day With Lilly Ledbetter

On April 14, Lilly Ledbetter joined with AAUW



of Arizona, Linda Hallman, AAUW CEO, the Phoenix Women's Commission, and over 200 other advocates to celebrate Equal Pay Day 2015. Dr. Carolyn Warner, Superintendent of AZ Public Instruction, and


AAUW Scottsdale branch member, introduced Lilly Ledbetter at the luncheon in Phoenix using this story: "The little boy (girl) asked the preacher what the saints were. He asked the child what he (she) thought they were. And with the brilliance that comes with childhood, remembering them being pictured in the stained glass windows, said, 'Oh, the saints are the people the light shines through.' So, I am honored to introduce the sainted woman the light shines through... Lilly Ledbetter." Sara Wolters and I, along with 35 other AAUW AZ branch members were delighted to be present at this luncheon honoring Lilly.

The City of Phoenix declared April 14, 2015, **Lilly Ledbetter Day.** Lilly Ledbetter took a stand when she learned that she'd long been receiving a lower salary than her male counterparts. She brought her pay discrimination case to the United States Supreme Court, and to Congress, and her story spurred the movement for equal pay. This year, her 77th birthday fell on Equal Pay Day — the day in the year that symbolizes how far into the year women must work to earn what men earned in the previous year. The very latest figures show that at a national level, women "earn" 78 cents for every dollar paid to their male peers. That's just a penny more than where the statistic has been for a decade.

AAUW has been urging members of Congress to co-sponsor the **Paycheck Fairness Act.** The measure provides a much-needed, first-ever update

to the Equal Pay Act of 1963, bringing the law's principles and practices in line with our nation's other civil rights laws. Without the Paycheck Fairness Act, women will continue to be silenced in the workplace and to struggle to make ends meet. With the Paycheck Fairness Act, women will be protected: Women workers will be able to talk about wages with co-workers without the fear of being fired. The Paycheck Fairness Act has a strong history of support, having twice passed in the U.S. House of Representatives with bipartisan majorities in prior Congresses and falling just two votes shy of a Senate cloture vote in the 111th Congress. Women and families are tired of waiting; it's time to pass the Paycheck Fairness Act.

Lilly's book, *Grace and Grit*, is the inspiring story of the woman at the center of the historic discrimination case that inspired the Lilly Ledbetter Fair Pay Restoration Act - her fight for equal rights in the workplace, and how her determination became a victory for the nation.

Report of Neighborhood Meetings

Over 70 AAUW Prescott members joined fellow neighborhood members in meetings on March 14 this year and enthusiastically participated in sharing views and ideas about our past and future programs and events. All the complete information from all of the neighborhood meetings has been circulated to the Board of Directors and all of the groups who benefit from this valuable feedback so that we can work to improve what we do. This means that, even when there were disagreements or conflicting opinions in any area, we shared everything with the responsible groups to allow them to pursue these issues.

Most **popular programs** included Viva la Verde, the presentation by Tim Carter (County School Superintendent), Human Trafficking, Prescott Center for the Arts presentation, and Girl Rising. Everyone who attended also appreciated the neighborhood meetings themselves, with the opportunity to get to know members who live in their area plus learn more about AAUW and our local operation.

We received lots of good **ideas for future programs**, from pursuing past topics more in-depth, covering medical and aging issues, introducing additional education and budget topics, to using our own members as resource persons to give presentations. There were quite a few (often conflicting) ideas for the Holiday Brunch, although it is a very popular event.

All of the neighborhood groups came up with many **ideas for fundraising** to generate income for our scholarships. Just a few of these were: silent auction at some of the monthly meetings; a "non-

event" event asking for donations in lieu of a fundraising event; an event with resale items and book exchange/sale; book event and /or author's luncheon; wine tasting tour.

Members generally like our **Prescott Branch** meeting format and did not have concerns over our local **budget**, although we can improve our communication by providing more frequent updates on our scholarships and continuing to use the neighborhood meetings to explain the budget or budget issues.

There was favorable response to our avenues of **communication**. Members access our informative website, avidly read the Thumb Sketch, and find the branch e-mails useful and not excessive.

Since our Prescott Branch is large, we are able to offer a good variety and number of **interest groups**. Members are quite satisfied with the current groups and offerings. Suggestions for future groups included more evening groups for working women, an art interest group, and a current events group. Another idea was to bring back interest group tables at general meetings, so members can learn about the groups.

Our two mission-based committees are Public Policy and Community Action. We received various suggestions for issues and study topics for **Public Policy**, and a plea to publish a program schedule possibly 3 to 6 months in advance to allow members to plan ahead and create interest in the programs. Some suggested topics were teacher retention, Arizona's education budget, legalization of marijuana issues, and Skyped interviews from distant sources.

Members unanimously support the **Community Action** Sister-to-Sister program. There is also

support for Woman-to-Woman and the Dreams to Reality Day. New ideas included adopting a classroom by neighborhood, bringing back AWARE (American Women Actively Returning to Education) with a brown bag lunch program support group, and collaboration with the League of Women Voters to provide a civics program for students. Members proposed engaging in community projects that would go beyond the focus on education and that would include the whole Ouad Cities area.

All in all, our neighborhood meetings were very productive, and our talented and capable members came through again by providing our organization with helpful feedback and productive suggestions that will enable us to keep our branch growing and moving forward.
