How often those words were spoken as members and students said good-bye to newly made friends on November 7th. "Yes, you can!" was the message that carried across a roomful of tables at Yavapai College when we hosted students from Chino Valley High School for their annual Sister-to-Sister luncheon. Teen author (and AAUW member) Stephanie Jefferson told the young women that she sees all of them in her heroine, a young woman facing many challenges and choices, but approaching each with the "Can do!" attitude.

Two current Yavapai College students—a mother and daughter-- addressed the group, offering suggestions about choosing classes, budgeting time, accepting responsibility for academic performance, becoming active in campus activities, securing financial aid—and, yes, even having fun.

Reflecting on the experience, one of the students stated: "I really enjoyed the women at my table and the stories they shared. I could relate to them. They very much inspired me." Another: "I enjoyed discussing my future plans with women who have gone through the college process." A third appreciated "how the ladies helped and supported us and encouraged us to try hard to reach our goals. Their stories motivated us to go to college knowing that we can do or be what we want."

The next Sister-to Sister luncheon has just been scheduled for February 5 - watch for details.

Because of the Holidays, the January Public Policy Committee will meet on Wednesday, January 2nd at 1:00 in the Founders' Room of the Prescott Public Library.

In January, PP will be discussing the new Common Core Standards. These Federal Standards have been created to improve public education and make American students more competitive; they are also designed to raise all public education to the same minimal standards. Because Arizona will be following these new standards, the impact on education will be felt in this state. February Public Policy

AAUW State Legislative Day, February 7, will be an interesting, educational day for all of us who travel to the State Capitol to learn more about important issues relevant to our mission, to hear exciting speeches, and to meet with our legislators. Jane Adrian, AAUW's lobbyist at the Capitol, will be providing important

information about the session and what issues we need to be following. She will also be explaining the new State-wide Legislative Alert system, whereby members can send emails to their legislators on important bills.

We will invite our representatives to either meet with us in their offices or join us for a free box lunch (we pay for our own). Our agenda will be discussing their legislative priorities and determining how we can work together to strengthen Arizona. Improving public education will probably be one of the topics we cover.

Members are asked to wear teal so the visual impact of AAUW is greater; we will be representing over 1,000 members in Arizona and want to ensure that our membership numbers are known. Additionally, a historical tour is being planned for those who are interested.

Fall Forum 2012

This was a wonderful meeting. The facility at Scottsdale Community College was comfortable as usual, and the buffet filled us with energy

for the second half of the meeting. The lunchtime roundtable meetings served to assist new branch officers with their responsibilities, and provided an opportunity to meet the state public policy chair, Jan Adrian, Scottsdale, and learn about state public policy plans for the year. Another round table discussed the possibility of starting a Tech Trek program in Arizona. This ad hoc committee has begun plans for presentation to the State Board at their meeting in January.

Both speakers were excellent and the one who lingers in my head a month after the meeting is Jodi Liggett, the Senior Policy Advisor on Homelessness in the Office of Mayor Greg Stanton of the City of Phoenix. It is a huge title for Jodi. Her expertise comes from her years as CEO of the Arizona Foundation for Women (AFW) and her talk was based on the research AFW did in 2010 on the status of women. She brought copies of this publication with her for the attendees. (I have one and would be willing to share it with branch members who were not in attendance. It would be a LOAN only!)

Jodi was a dynamic speaker with a passion for her work and the work of AFW. The publication covers many areas, and I will only highlight some of them in this article; they all fit with our AAUW mission: economic, education, health, social justice and political participation. These data reflect the position of Arizona women in

national ranking. Arizona women rank 21^{st} in median income and 26^{th} in women over the poverty line. In education AZ ranks 49^{th} in women with a high school diploma. AZ is also 49^{th} in available prenatal care and 45^{th} in health care coverage for women. In the category of Social Justice, AZ is 29^{th} in affordability of infant child care and 46^{th} in child support enforcement. We are 43^{td} in women voter registration.

These statistics say a lot about the status of women. However, the statistics that absolutely made me cringe were in relation to single mothers: 27% of single mothers get no child support. If there is welfare for the child, there is no child support required. Welfare was just cut to \$277 per month, and the lifetime cap was adjusted downward to two-and-a-half years. There can be no change to this until 2014, and any change is not guaranteed.

To itemize more about what the Arizona legislature does for and against women, Jodi referenced several bills: SB1359, HB2036, HB2625, HB2800, HB2627. Feel free to look them up at ALIS, Arizona Legislative Information System. We can also register there to testify on bills presented for legislative action.

Our other speaker was Claudia Richards, AAUW Senior Grant Field Relations Manager. For new attendees, she provided a lot of information about how the AAUW National office functions. Her particular position supports membership growth and retention. She recommended that branches check Programs in a Box (PIAB) online to find programs and projects for events to bring in new members and get past members to re-join. There are some programs that are designed to be fund raisers as well. She specifically mentioned the Princeton Review program for SAT reviews, and the film "The Invisible War" about sexual abuse in the military.

The program that allows members to pay their dues online also has the capability to create invoices for dues.

Claudia outlined the focus of AAUW in each aspect of the mission. In education, the focus is on \$tart \$mart, Elect Her and NCCWSL. In philanthropy, it's scholarships and Tech Trek. (Funds are available from National to support a program in new states.) The research focus is on the recently released "Graduating to the Pay Gap." And there are two new research projects: an update to the Simple Truth

about the Pay Gap is due out on April 17th, in time for equal pay date, and a study on Community Colleges is also due out in 2013.

Finally, she encouraged us all to use the website www.aauw.org to find information that is useful for branches, individual members, and new officers. One item she pointed out that was new to me is a form for contributions to AAUW. It will allow members to designate the fund to which they contribute.

There was much information packed

into a day that was only about 5+ hours long. Scottsdale Community College is not far away, and the college president, Dr. Jan Gehler, is always very welcoming to us. She is an AAUW member, as is SCC and they make their facilities available for us without charge. The registration for the day is reasonable and includes the meal.
