You may have read recently about a \$200,000 gift to the Del E. Webb Family Enrichment Center from May and Worth Mallory. What you may not know is that May and Worth were both members of our branch during the years when we were advocating for a childcare center Worth served on our board as in Prescott. Fall Rendezvous Summary

The Fall Rendezvous held on October 26 in East Mesa had the most vibrant program in many years. It was mission based and thought provoking for the 82 attendees. East Mesa Branch did an excellent job and State Program Vice President Harriet Young made use of her university contacts to arrange the programs. Fine work, all! The Program included:

A panel discussion entitled "Across Generations: What Today's Women Want and Need from AAUW," it was moderated by Mary Logan Rothschild, PhD, Professor Emerita, Women and Gender Studies at ASU.

- Carrie Robbins defined *networking* as an activity that generates success.
- Meredith Clark explained that "feminism" means equity for all, regardless of race, class, age, sex, etc
- Alicia Woodbury spoke about a generational memory gap for the feminist movement.
- In the Question and Answer session, an important question was posed: "How can AAUW form networks with young women?" On a practical level, AAUW could offer PhD internships and form relationships with departments such as Women's Studies, communications and journalism.
- Dr. Rothschild noted on the financial topic that students don't expect to be poor while attending college. Most students have "their heads in the sand" about social and political issues. "

The keynote speaker was Anne Schneider, served at ASU from 1989 until retirement as Dean of the College of Public Programs and as professor of Justice Studies and Political Science. Her topic was "Arizona 51st Legislature in Review." She made a couple of references to the federal legislature, explaining that the Hassert Rule in the House of Representatives prevents bi-partisanship. They should let the moderates introduce bills. She divided Arizona legislative action into three categories: *kudos, kooky and sneaky.*

- Kudos went to Governor Brewer for extending Medicaid, which covers mostly women and girls; kudos also for increasing funding for K-12 and university education.
- Kooky Stuff includes bills that fortunately failed in the legislature. These include the Bathroom bill, a bill to change the recall rules; one regarding an atheist prayer on the senate floor; one to promote driverless cars, and another to regulate drones in Arizona.

 Sneaky stuff includes strike everything bills, often promoted by the Center for Arizona Policy. A strike everything bill removes everything but the name of the bill and puts in (usually) totally unrelated subject matter. These bills relate to health care, voter suppression and rights for embryos.

• Dr. Schneider finally suggested that for Legislative Day we pay attention to what the Governor does.

Julia Brown, AAUW Vice-President came to the Rendezvous from Las Cruces, New Mexico. She spoke about "Human and Sex Trafficking." She defined it as illegal recruitment of another person for exploitation. Typically the victims do not self-report and they are under the age of consent. The Woman's Funding Network has an online tool kit. Other active organizations are Arizona League to End Regional Trafficking, Catholic Charities Dignity Program, and Streetlight USA. The Arizona Governor's Task Force on Human and Sex Trafficking has just issued its report, available online. January is Stop Trafficking month. Watch for events on **January 10**.

AAUW Prescott Supports Women and Children

AAUW Prescott has two fundraising commitments. One of those is the Red Envelope giving which was solicited at the Holiday Brunch. These funds go to our commitment to support AAUW national. The other, probably more dear to our hearts, is endowing scholarships for young and not so young women attending Yavapai Community College (YC).

We have endowed the Mary Alice Moulton (MAM) Scholarship for childcare at the Del E. Webb Family Enrichment Center (FEC) at Yavapai College. We usually award two or three scholarships a year. This is given to a young mother who has her child(ren) enrolled in FEC.

On November 21st, two recipients of MAM were awarded. The scholarships are worth \$500 a piece. Because these recipients are low income, the scholarship will pay for approximately two months of tuition. One scholarship went to a woman who is working 40 to 45 hours a week, and has completed 15 credit hours toward a degree in social work or special education. The second woman has completed 18 credit hours toward a degree in social work. Her husband is also a student at YC. You should all be proud that you are helping female students place their children in the Family Education Center on the YC campus and know that these children are receiving a high quality education in a safe environment.

At the last branch board meeting a thank you note was read from Monique, a scholarship recipient. She thanks you all.

The scholarship fundraising events are now focused on raising monies for the Centennial Scholarship which will benefit a second year, female student who is pursuing an AA degree in a STEM field. We hope that, we will be able to begin distributing awards from this fund soon.

The committee is planning an author event. We have decided that we will hold an author luncheon late summer or early fall of 2014. The reason for postponing the event is that the Community Room at YC is busy with graduation events in the spring.

Learning Life's Lessons: Budgeting and Career Options

On March 22, 2014, AAUW – Prescott's Community Action Project "The Dreams To Reality" event will take place at Yavapai College Community Room, from 8:30 a.m. to 4:30 p.m. The event is targeted at girls (14 years) through young women in college. This event is collaboration among AAUW-Prescott, Girl Scouts of Prescott, Yavapai College, and North Star Youth Partnership.

In the Reality Store portion of the event, the girls will assume the role of women, at least 25 years old with a family and a chosen career. AAUW members will act as storekeepers at 20 tables where the girls can shop using checkbooks to record their purchases for the month. Participants will pay taxes and make a budget using their salary, then make choices in purchasing food, clothing, housing, and transportation and anything needed for their family for the month. Girls actively make choices at each table and manage life surprises that come their way. The wrap-up session will discuss what choices they found difficult, what surprised them in the process, what sacrifices did they make when their salary did not cover their needs. The result is that their eyes are opened to the cost of living and the struggles to make ends meet. They are encouraged to think about the possibility that they could extend their education in order to have a higher paying job that will bring a better lifestyle for their family.

After a pizza luncheon, the Career Fair portion of the day will run from about 1:00 to 4:30 p.m. with the girls rotating through stations about every 15 minutes where speakers will describe careers and their journeys. What path led them through their career or careers; what failures and risks did they face; what new things did they explore; what guided them; how crooked was their path? Careers will include nontraditional fields, STEM, social service, medical, arts, and business, among others.

We are <u>seeking</u> **35 AAUW volunteers** for the morning, to run the tables for the Reality Store portion of the event. Specific assignment will be made for each volunteer.

Dot Williamson will have a clipboard for sign ups at the January General Meeting. Please see her to sign up. If you will not be attending the meeting, please give her a call to volunteer. Her number is in the AAUW directory. Volunteers must have an email account.

Sharon Ann Hochstettler ("Sherri")

Sharon Hochstettler passed away peacefully on October29, 2013, at the age of 76. Sherri was born on August 29, 1937, in Toledo, Ohio. She grew up in Findlay, Ohio.



As a high school sophomore Sherri met her future

husband, David Hochstettler, when they found themselves assigned to the same homeroom. After dating through high school and college, Sherri and Dave married in 1958. They recently celebrated 55 years of marriage and 61 years of love, trust and joy.

After high school Sherri attended Wittenberg University and North Central College before graduating from the University of Illinois in 1961. She later received her master's degree from Arizona State University.

Sherri's professional career began in 1958, when she began teaching kindergarten in Warrenville, Illinois. She later taught in elementary grades in Tuscola, Illinois; Harvey, Illinois; Germantown, Ohio; Phoenix, Arizona and Syracuse, New York.

After being certified as a reading specialist, Sherri taught in the Prescott Unified Schools until her retirement in 1997. Her assignments sometimes took her to Dexter and Lincoln Schools, but most of her work as a Special Reading Teacher was done at Washington Traditional School. A pioneer in the use of computerassisted instruction, Sherri established the first computer lab at Washington School. Students there often thought of her as "the computer teacher." Near the end of her career she returned to teaching her favorite students: kindergarteners.

Beyond Washington School, Sherri taught classes in reading and classroom computing for Yavapai College and Northern Arizona University. She often presented at regional and national conferences, trained teachers in school districts around Arizona, and was active in several professional organizations.

Sherri's favorite times were family times: holidays, ski trips, camping, and travel. She read avidly, loved bridge games, and treasured her many friendships.


