Scholarship Fundraising Update

Our endowments continue to grow. As of December 31, 2013, The Mary Alice Moulton Childcare Assistance Fund Scholarship (MAMCAF) has grown to \$47,572.13 and the Centennial Scholarship is \$12,457.53.

In 2013, we awarded four \$500 scholarships from the MAMCAF to help young female students send their children to the Del E. Webb Family Enrichment Center.

In the fall of 2014, we will be able to award our first scholarship from the Centennial fund to a STEM student.

In other fundraising news, we are working with Peregrine Books to secure authors for our **Authors' Luncheon on August 23, 2014**.... Save that Date!

Income Tax Deduction: Information Concerning Dues

Just a reminder, a portion of your National AAUW dues is tax deductible for the year 2013. **If you paid the full amount of \$85 for the year 2013-14, you can deduct \$46.**

If you paid the half price of \$42.50 (those who joined between January 1, 2013 and March 15, 2013), the portion of your National Dues that is deductible will be \$23.

Volunteerism:

A Noble Outreach in the Community

At the **April 12th AAUW meeting**, representatives from four area outreach organizations will present information on what they offer to the community and ways in which we can help!

There are many opportunities to volunteer in the Prescott area, but perhaps you haven't realized that there's more than meets the eye in these four important organizations. We will feature the following outstanding community volunteer leaders:

- *Corie Burke*, the daughter of the founder of Stepping Stones, will tell us what they do to **protect and shelter** abused women and children. Stepping Stones is more than a thrift store, though that is an important part of their mission.
- *Patricia Trevillian* from AWEE, Arizona Women in Education and Employment, will tell us how they help women returning to the work force and **enable** them by bolstering their skills, helping them apply for jobs, helping them find jobs, and by providing appropriate clothing for interviews and work.
- *Julianna Gostwick* from BBBS, Big Brothers & Big Sisters, will share stories about the importance of **sharing** your time and experience with a child in need of an adult friend and role model. Most often, the Big gets as much or more from the relationship than the Little.
- *Paul Mitchell* of Adult Education Programs will tell us how we can help **educate** non-readers or non-English speakers, making it possible for them to find employment or gain citizenship. These are people who really have a deep desire to learn! They make the best students!

We hope you'll join us in the Community Room at Yavapai College at 9:00 for the social time and 10:00 for this interesting program. You may find that you have a small amount of time to fill a need in one of these worthwhile organizations.

Openings Available in the 2nd Tuesday Book Group

The 2nd Tuesday Book Group has openings available to members.

We average five members per meeting. Therefore, each member has the opportunity to participate fully in the discussion. **We meet at 10:00 a.m. at the library, in the Bump Room, which is reserved 30 minutes before and 30 minutes after our meeting so we have time to socialize.** We do not have refreshments but often go to lunch after our meeting. We begin each meeting with a 30-minute discussion of books we have read, recommend, don't recommend; give updates about books in the news, authors, reading technology, etc. And we trade books.

We rotate our book selections to include fiction, nonfiction, and topics. The topics category is helpful when the subject is extensive; but one that not every member chooses to approach in the same way, e.g. by reading a fiction or nonfiction. In honor of Banned Book month, for example, we read and discussed banned books. Other topics have covered China, The Human Brain, Catherine the Great, India, and favorite poems. On May 13 we will discuss books by or about Margaret Fuller, an early American feminist.

AAUW ARIZONA CONFERENCE ON THE STATUS OF ARIZONA WOMEN 2014

This special event is a follow-up to the panel discussions at the Fall Rendezvous. In order for AAUW to fulfill its mission to remove the barriers to the success of women and girls, from time to time we need to make an assessment of where we are and where we want to go.

Since 1881, AAUW has led the movement for equality for women in education and in the work place. In 2014 we face a mixed environment for women in Arizona. While we have women leading universities, colleges and academic departments, we see an upswing in violence against women, a resurgence of women's health issues used to enflame traditional values, and an increase of women in poverty raising children in poverty. In an effort to find solutions, we need to understand causes. For this reason we turn to our academics in the field of Women and Gender Studies for answers. As we search for meaningful insight, we invite our principal investigators within women's studies to shed light on the current situation for women in Arizona and offer their views on a way forward.

The day's agenda includes Jodi Liggett of Planned Parenthood, Public Policy, who will speak; that speech will be followed by two panels of students discussing "Where are Arizona Women?" and "Where Do We Want to Go?"

Remembering Nancy Matte

On January 31 Prescott AAUW lost a good friend. Nancy La Rue Matte passed away after a heroic battle with cancer. Those of us who were privileged to know her well admired her courage greatly and were heartened by her spirit.



Last spring, Nancy described her process of downsizing as she prepared to move from her Prescott home to Groom Creek where she became the housemate of her friend, Betty Elliott. For our writers' group she wrote: "I really thought about what was necessary for me to keep. And it turned out to be very little. Being able to give things to individual people felt very right and satisfying, knowing that the items would be important or useful to them. This made it easier to release other things. I had made some sort of transition and having things was more of a burden than a necessity." Nancy was energized throughout the process and "even mailed family pictures and Christmas ornaments to my ex-husband."

Nancy received her Ph.D. in English Literature from ASU where she ran a program to help students prepare for college. At South Mountain Community College, she ran a Learning Assistance Center. At Phoenix College, she served as the chair of the English Department.

While Nancy taught hundreds of students over her 40 years in education, she taught those of us in Prescott who knew her, even more valuable life lessons.

We honor and miss her.

February 20th was AAUW Legislative Day at the State Capitol and five members from the Prescott branch traveled to the Phoenix Capitol to join the AAUW Arizona Lobby Corps.

The AAUW Prescott Public Policy group had set up meetings with two of our local state representatives, Senator Steve Pierce and Representative Karen Fann. In our discussions with our District Representatives, we had positive and courteous conversations about the need to adequately fund public education. Steve Pierce strongly suggested that AAUW members consider sending their representatives and the Governor letters or emails supporting the Common Core program. The State Legislature recently passed several bills that would defund the Common Core implementation in Arizona or allow Arizona to essentially ignore the Common Core requirements. We are hopeful that the Governor will veto these bills but it is very important that our representatives know that we support the use of national standards to measure the effectiveness of K-12 education in Arizona.

We also voiced our support for HB 2454, which increases the penalties for human trafficking.

It is important to have our voices heard at the legislature and the best way to do that is for you to join us for our annual lobby day at the Capitol next February!
