Public Policy Committee to Explore Mental Health Needs

On Wednesday, March 5th at 1:00 pm, the Public Policy Committee for AAUW will meet in Founders' Suite B at the library to explore mental health needs. Laura Norman from West Yavapai Guidance Clinic will make a presentation about what is being done locally to help the mentally ill. We will also share written materials from the National Alliance on Mental Illness (NAMI) about current mental health issues and will discuss ways that we can make a difference. Some issues we will explore include educating teachers to be alert to early signs of mental illness, possible roles for police in getting help for people who display behavior that may be of concern, and where family members of the mentally ill can go for help. If It's April, It's Time for "Teen Maze"!

April comes to a close in Prescott with the countywide event, Teen Maze. Sponsored by many of the organizations that support children in our community, the three-day event encourages young people to make good choices.

AAUW assists our Sister-to-Sister partners, Educational Talent Search (ETS) in a booth suggesting education as the key to many future choices.

Over the three days (April 24-26) we need about 24 AAUW members to "work" two-hour shifts, shepherding students through the education booth. We will briefly interact with the students and this, once again, fulfills our mission.

If you have never participated, try it! You will meet not only high-energy students, but hundreds of adults who support kids in our community. That, alone, is AMAZING!

Sign-up sheets will be available at the neighborhood meetings and at the April Saturday meeting.

Reality Store and Career Fair for Girls

AAUW, the Girl Scouts (providing state-wide publicity), North Star Youth Partnership, and local schools are working together to provide a Reality Store and Career Fair for middle school through high school aged girls. The event will kick-off with Claire Louge as the key-note speaker on April 6 at Prescott College's CrossRoads Center.

Fifty to 75 girls are expected to arrive at 9:30 a.m. with their registration forms and \$5 to pay for the day, including lunch. Beginning at 10:00, the girls will roleplay as women about 28 years old with families and chosen careers. Each one will purchase food, clothing, housing, transportation, and anything needed for her family within her salary. AAUW members will act as storekeepers at 20 tables where the girls can shop using checkbooks to record their purchases for a month. Girls will actively make choices as to how much to spend at each table and manage life surprises that come their way. The wrap-up session will discuss what choices they found difficult, what surprised them in the process, what sacrifices they made when their career salaries did not cover their needs. They will be encouraged to think about the possibility that they could extend their education in order to have higher paying jobs that would bring better lifestyles for their families.

After a pizza luncheon, the Career Fair portion of the day will run from 1:00 to 3:30 p.m. with the girls rotating through stations about every 20 minutes where speakers (AAUW members and others from the community) will describe their careers and their journeys: what path led them through their career or

careers; what failures and risks they faced; what new things they explored; what guided them; and how crooked were their paths?

This event was successfully run in California over a few years beginning with 3 Girl Scout Troops. When the Girl Scout Council of Orange County decided to replicate it, it was opened to 25,000 girls. This is the first year it is being presented in Prescott. The hope is to do it every year in order for more girls to participate and gain realistic visions for their futures.

To be successful, 8 more AAUW members are needed as storekeepers, and 4 more are needed to help in the afternoon. The storekeepers' hours run from 8:45 to noon. Training will be from about 9:00 to 9:30. Career speakers have already been enlisted. The career speakers will need to be there from 12:30 to 3:30.

This community action project has been in the works for a year. When polled, a large number of our AAUW members indicated they were former Scouts and that they were willing to help. Now is the time to contact Pat Mann with your commitment to be a shopkeeper for the education of these girls. You can also commit to this project at the neighborhood meetings and interest group meetings where one person or the group leader will send the names to Pat.

Tech Trek Coming to AZ

What is Tech Trek? It is a weeklong camp for middle school girls that takes place on a college campus and introduces them to STEM careers (Science, Technology, Engineering and Mathematics).

In 2013, AAUW will expand Tech Trek nationwide with the addition of five new pilot sites in Ohio, Oklahoma, Florida, Texas and Washington. AAUW is providing assistance to states, including a \$10,000 grant, to host a Tech Trek camp.

At their January quarterly meeting, the AAUW-AZ board approved a request from the State STEM Exploratory Committee Chair, Michelle Higgins, to proceed to plan a statewide Tech Trek camp for the summer of 2014. The preferred location would be on the NAU campus in Flagstaff for about 40 girls. The cost to attend a camp will be approximately \$800. Each attendee's family will be asked to pay \$50. Branches, in collaboration with other statewide and community organizations, will be asked to provide scholarships for each girl they sponsor. AAUW-AZ has agreed to help underwrite some of the costs of sending girls to camp.

You missed it? It was a sight to see! It was AAUW's Legislative Day, February 7, 2013, with 70 members from fourteen AAUW Arizona branches arriving at the

Capitol in Phoenix

attired in variations of blue-green, teal and turquoise. An *Arizona Teal Machine* emerged in the Arizona winter sun to meet with our state representatives to advocate policies that advance equity for women and girls in Arizona.

Ten members from AAUW Prescott traveled to the Phoenix Capitol, leaving before dawn, to join the AAUW Arizona Lobby Corps. The AAUW Prescott Public Policy group had pre-arranged to meet with our local state representatives, Senator Steve Pierce, Representative/House Speaker, Andy Tobin, and Representative Karen Fann.

Speaker Tobin had agreed to meet our Prescott constituency at the assembly room where the Lobby Corps was gathered at 10:30 a.m. When he entered the room, a Prescott member introduced him as House

Speaker and Prescott's District Representative. He asked the room of bluegreen arrayed women for questions. He called on one of our Prescott members with her hand raised, but she explained that the Prescott group was "waiting to take him outside to speak to him," and the whole assembly broke into boisterous laughter at the unintended double entendre.

In AAUW Prescott's exclusive discussions with
