Membership Renewal FY 2014-2015 July 1, 2014 through June 30, 2015

It is time to renew your membership for the next year, beginning July 1, 2014. Dues are \$85 annually, of which \$49 goes to national membership, \$9 goes to AZ state membership, and \$27 goes to AAUW-Prescott. \$46 of your national dues is tax deductible. <u>The deadline for renewal is</u> June 30, 2014.

- 1. **Option One:** Pay your dues by check (made out for \$85 to "AAUW-Prescott"), and send to our Treasurer, Jenine Peterson at her address (in the directory).
- 2. **Option Two:** Pay your dues online by credit card. Go to <u>www.aauw.org</u>, and follow these instructions: (*Note: Some members have been* getting error messages when using Internet Explorer to renew online. If this happens, try a different browser: Mozilla Firefox or Google Chrome)
 - Click Login (small menu at top of page).
 - Enter member number or click on Register if this is your first time here. 2a) If you know your member number and password, enter them and click login. 2b) If you have to look up your member number and/or password follow instructions to retrieve it.
 - When you are successfully logged in, scroll down to the bottom of the page and click on Member Tools.
 - Click on "Enter Here" at the bottom of Member Services Database
 - Click on "Enter Member Services Database" Check to see that your demographic information is current. If it isn't, change it.

Scholarship Fund Update Monies for Scholarships Greatly Appreciated!

The Scholarship Committee works hard all year to raise and then keep track of the funds generated for our scholarships. As of January 31st of this year, The Mary Alice Moulton Childcare Assistance Fund (MAM) is worth \$46,239.72 and the AAUW Centennial Scholarship is worth \$12,200.61.

Once again, AAUW-Prescott will be able to give four \$500 scholarships for childcare at the Del E. Webb Family Enrichment Center. Additionally, for the first time, we will be able to award a \$500 scholarship to a second-semester female student, with at least a B average, who is pursuing a STEMrelated program at Yavapai College.

In April, Elaine Smith had the good fortune to meet one of our MAM scholarship recipients. Dove is a mom of two, one of whom attends the Family Enrichment Center. She works full time at Washington Traditional and is a part-time waitress at Papa's Italian Restaurant. Initially, she thought about majoring in Elementary Education, but now is leaning toward Speech Therapy. With the scholarship, Dove said she was able to breathe a sigh of relief during the two months that our scholarship covered the childcare tuition.

Neighborhood Meetings Offer Perspective Patti Blackwood Reports Back, Part 1



In March, in lieu of our usual General Meeting at Yavapai College, we enjoyed eight neighborhood meetings where we gathered in the homes of members. These meetings gave us an opportunity to meet socially with those members who live close to us, including those we may never have met. They also allowed for group discussions and a voice in the future direction of our branch.

To that end, each group meeting considered and discussed a number of questions regarding their views and reactions to the current workings of the branch. **Below are responses** to the request to comment on "suggestions for the communication committee," **specifically addressing thoughts about branch emails, the website, and the Thumb Sketch**.

Regarding branch emails, the general consensus of all the groups was that the number of branch emails has decreased recently, which is appreciated. Many members check the website regularly and appreciate the fact that it is updated in a timely manner. The tutorials at the General Meetings were thought to be "very helpful."

Regarding the "Thumb Sketch," it is well read by the membership and articles regarding future events for the branch are most appreciated.

In general, the **branch's means and manner of communicating works well** and keeps the membership well informed.

Cathy Cunningham: AAUW Board Member Representative on YRMC Council of Electors

AAUW is one of 26 organizations sitting on the Council of Electors, the body that elects the Board of Directors for Yavapai Regional Medical Center (YRMC). AAUW board member Cathy Cunningham has served as the council chair this year. Below is a brief history of how this council was established.

Before the mid-1980s, members of the Board of Directors were elected by popular vote. However, as health care became increasingly expensive and complex, it became apparent that the YMRC Board of Directors needed to understand business and finance, planning, management, and the role of the board in policymaking. In a general election in 1988, voters agreed to establish Council of Electors to select hospital board members.

Representatives from each city council and public school district, colleges, county supervisors, and a variety of community groups participate in this council. AAUW has been a member of this council since its inception. It is a requirement of the Council of Electors that our representative also be on our own AAUW-Prescott Board of Directors.

The council meets several times during the year to determine the interview process and questions to be asked of all candidates, to review resumes of candidates, and to interview those they select as strong candidates. Based on these interviews, the council then selects the people who will serve on the Board of Directors for the next five years.

In Memoriam Worth Mallory, Dedicated Educator



Worth Mallory, the beloved husband of May Mallory, passed away on March 4, 2014. He was 95 years old.

Mr. Mallory's career was devoted to education and included years as a teacher and as a high school principal. Moving to Prescott to retire in

the mid 1980's, he met and married May. Both were active members of AAUW. Avid bridge players, May and Worth were founding members of the AAUW bridge group, formed in 2000. Additionally, May and Worth were both members of our branch during the years when we were advocating for a childcare center in Prescott. Worth served on our board as Educational Equity Chair in 2000-01.

Many members have recalled his generosity and kind spirit. "He was truly a wonderful person and anyone who knew him respected and loved him," wrote one of our members in an email to the Thumb Sketch editors, "He made the world a better place."

Indeed, Mr. Mallory cared very much about young children and considered it his mission to promote their well-being and education. To that end, he and May established the Worth and FEC Endowment Fund for the Del E. Webb Family Enrichment Center (now FEC) at Yavapai College with a substantial donation in 2013. Designed to create a sustainable revenue stream for the program, Mr. Mallory hoped to see their fund support "progressive advances" in early childhood care and education.

"May and I see this as more than a donation," said Mr. Mallory. "We see it as an investment in the future of children in Yavapai County."

Through our own scholarship fund that supports mothers whose children attend FEC, AAUW-Prescott is honored to help uphold Worth Mallory's vision for quality education in Yavapai County.

Regional Conference in Reno Draws Many from Around the West

The next Rocky Mountain Regional AAUW Conference will be held in Reno, Nevada, in June. The program is in the works, and participants are expected from New Mexico, Utah, Colorado, Wyoming, Montana, Nevada and Arizona. Some Arizona members are already planning to go, to enjoy the meetings, to renew friendships started some years ago at other conferences, and to enjoy the Siena Hotel which sits on the bank of the Truckee River in downtown Reno.

The dates are June 6, 7, and 8, a Friday, Saturday and Sunday. So far, we know this much about the program:

• Patricia Ho, AAUW National President, will be the dinner speaker on Saturday evening.

• The theme: The Western Woman – Her Attitudes, Values and Priorities will be presented by a speaker from Project New West, an organization that has years of research on trends, issues and demographics in the west.

• A workshop on Politics vs. Partisan

• A program by Awaken, a Reno nonprofit whose mission is to help women who are victims of commercial sex trafficking.

Each state is to bring a presentation, so there will be other informative sessions. There are still openings for ideas, especially as Arizona has not yet determined the topic or format of its presentation.

Dreams to Reality 2nd Year Sees 50% Increase

On March 22, from 8:30 a.m. to 4:30 p.m., at Yavapai College, AAUW members partnered with local agencies, including the Girl Scouts and Northstar Youth Partnership, to present a unique, hands-on simulation for seventy-seven 8th grade, high school, and college-age women and girls entitled, "Dreams to Reality[®]." This included The Reality Store[®] in the morning and the opportunity to interview successful Prescott women about their careers in the afternoon. It was the second year of this program and the number of girls attending increased by 50% over last year!

At The Reality Store[®], students selected a career they would like to have as an adult. They were then given a register containing the amount earned as an average monthly salary in that occupation. The students then went through the Reality Store[®], staffed in part by AAUW members, spending their salary by making active choices on the necessities and luxuries they envision as part of their adult lifestyle. This simulation helped students to learn to budget and to discover whether their selected occupation would provide the type of lifestyle they expect and want.

The Reality Store[®] simulation helps young people examine their attitudes about their futures and their career expectations. They learn basic skills in money management, how to make good choices, and the ins and outs of career planning. This valuable program aims to inspire students to stay in school, stay away from drugs, and to avoid early pregnancy.

The afternoon Career Fair included 18 local women in fields that included STEM, Medicine, Arts/Humanities, Legal, Non-Profits, International Development, Global Business and Non-Traditional fields for women.

Evaluations were very positive from both the girls and volunteers. Some made suggestions that we will consider for changes for next year's program: we are always working to improve and grow.


