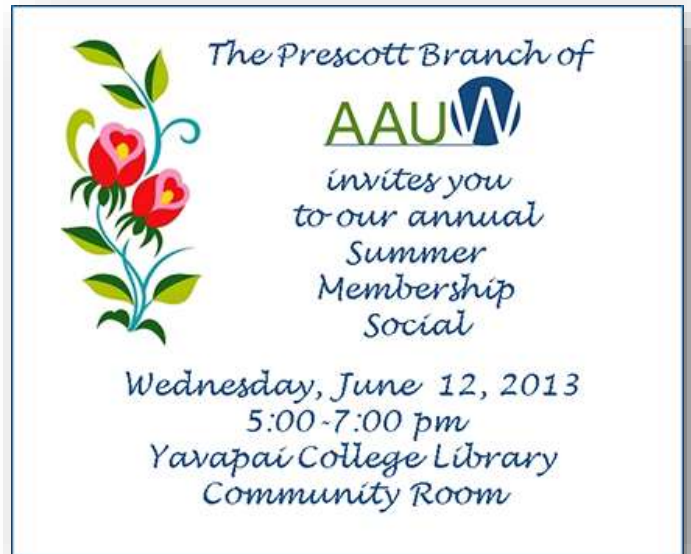

As the demand continues for knowledgeable workers in the rapidly growing wine industry, students completing the new Viticulture and Enology programs at YC will find themselves prepared for this highly competitive market.

On **Saturday, May 11**, Steve Walker, VP of College Advancement at YC and a good friend of AAUW Prescott, will fill in all the blanks concerning this new from the ground up program. Yavapai College is the only college in the SW United States offering a degree program in Viticulture and Enology.

At the Southwest Wine Center students will help prepare the ground and plant 17 acres of vines over the next three years. The public is invited to participate in a planting on May 4th at the YC campus in Clarkdale.

Steve Walker is bringing bottles of wine to be given to six lucky attendees at the May 11th meeting.

Despite it being a snowy, blustery day, our



February AAUW Funds Fundraiser was an unqualified success. Many members donned their red and joined together for a fun, festive and formative morning. Jennifer Bartos and Barrington House presented *Somewhere in Time in America*, a historical walk through a period between the

Revolutionary War and World War 1 in authentic and beautifully designed dresses from each era. Jennifer provided historical information along with descriptions of the outfits and ended with pictures of Prescott women in their finest from days past. We raised **\$1,595.00** in red envelope donations for our national AAUW projects.

A special thank you goes to Sharyn Baker for arranging the program, acting as interim Hospitality Chair and to all those who contributed to creating the perfect atmosphere and refreshments for a tea party extraordinaire.

The Reality Store

On Saturday, April 6, about 25 AAUW-Prescott members volunteered to work a unique, hands-on workshop for middle school and high school age girls called “Dreams to Reality” which was held at Prescott College. This included “The Reality Store” in the morning and in the afternoon, a chance for the girls to interview successful Prescott women about their careers and how they chose them. This event was sponsored by Girls Scouts of Prescott, AAUW (by way of volunteers and a \$200 grant from our Community Action,) and North Star Youth Partnership.

The Reality Store® program helps all students examine their attitudes about their futures and their career expectations. They learn basic skills in money management, making good choices and career planning. As a result, the program helps to motivate students to stay in

school, stay away from drugs and avoid early pregnancy.

Girls shared their experience by stating that they were “shocked” by the cost of childcare. And, they were unaware of many of the monthly expenses involved in supporting a family, such as taxes, utilities, insurance, medical care. They stated that they became much more aware of the need to make wise financial decisions and the pressures on their parents. On Student Evaluation forms, overall the responses most often given were that they learned “quite a bit”, to “a lot” about:

- The need to budget
- What it costs to run a household
- What it costs to raise a child
- How the job you have affects the money you’ll make
- How the money earned affects your lifestyle

Student Evaluation forms also revealed that most planned to “definitely”:

- Try harder in school
- Get more education after high school
- Make wise financial decisions and save more

Student Evaluations revealed that students reacted very positively to the Career Fair portion of the day as well. They liked that there were careers that they did not know

existed. Girls shared that they learned that it’s important to stay in school, and choose a career that you love, rather than just for the money. They felt more empowered to take risks, explore new fields, and talk to more adults. Suggestions included:

- More time for the event
- More speakers to choose from

Adult volunteers shared that they really enjoyed the day and the chance to interact with and influence the girls. They also made very good suggestions for improving the event. These are being reviewed and will be definitely be taken into account in planning next year’s “Dreams To Reality” event.

Thank you to all who helped with this event. You definitely made a positive impact on many girls.—Pat Mann

April 6, 2013 AAUW AZ Convention Report

For the first time in recent memory, all of the Arizona AAUW branches were present at the AAUW AZ annual convention, hosted by our sister branch in Tucson, AZ. Arizona's favorite daughter in AAUW, CEO Linda Hallman, welcomed the group at the Friday evening dinner.



The Native National Anthem and dance were presented by Nieves Miljure (AAUW Tucson) and her brother George L"Ty-Noche" Montero.

Following dinner, Margo Cowan, **Pima County Public Defender**, presented a much-appreciated historical perspective of immigration in Arizona. A native of

southern AZ, she spoke of the distressing and tragic turn taken by what used to be free movement of migrant families. Once a generation, she stressed, our country has addressed the concern of a growing migrant population, each time failing to pass fair legislation that recognizes the economic necessity of migrant laborers and the protection of their families.

Saturday began with remarks by Dr. Ann Weaver Hart, president of Arizona University. Her message of optimism about women succeeding in such roles included their embracing non-traditional paths. She stressed the importance of mentors on those paths and the importance of pushing through doubts and resisting professional bullying. Each day in her job she faces challenges; the greatest at present, is financial.

AAUW Executive Director, Linda Hallman, introduced us to the new AAUW website, using a power point presentation to highlight the main changes. She talked about the search and decisions behind the new logo design. The bold, brighter colors and adding the phrase "Empowering Women Since 1881" was done to boost its recognition when it is used in print and electronically. She reminded the attendees to **vote** beginning April 15th. The most recent edition of **Outlook** has the information on the candidates running for election as well as the proposed bylaw changes. To vote electronically, a "pin number" will be emailed to members soon.

Michelle Steinberg, spokeswoman for Planned Parenthood of Arizona, addressed the few successes and many failures in state public policy decisions regarding

women's health issues. Citing the 20,000 teen pregnancies per year (ages 15-19) and high rate of STD's among teens in Arizona, she stressed support for legislation that requires sex education in all AZ schools. Her good news was that the morning-after birth control pills would be available over-the-counter within 30 days.

Former AZ Senator, Paula Aboud, and Executive Director of the Secular Coalition for Arizona, Serah Blain, woke up the audience when they challenged the branches to decide what issue/issues were worth a fight in Arizona. Citing the size of our membership and breadth of geographic representation, they both urged us to make a commitment to educate not only our legislators but also our communities.

Michelle Higgins, Senior Director of STEM for Southern AZ Girl Scouts, closed the convention with the announcement of an AAUW and Girl Scout partnership to bring a TechTrek camp to Arizona during the summer of 2014. With a grant from AAUW national and assistance from AAUWAZ and the Girl Scouts, coupled with a state-wide committee, she is optimistic that Arizona can join the growing number of states

supporting STEM education for girls. Future communication from Michelle will detail the contributions suggested for AZ branches.

Officers elected by the convention include President Elect **Jane Adrian** of Scottsdale; Recording Secretary Rhysa Davis of East Valley;

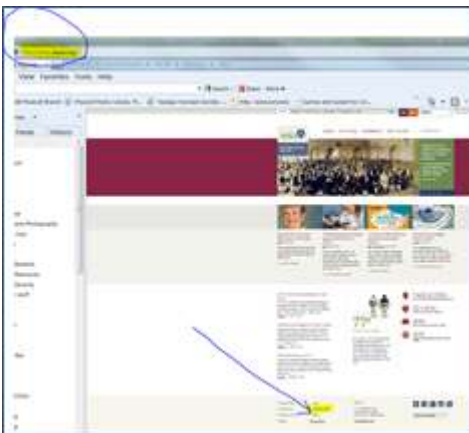

How to be a Group Leader Extraordinaire

It is important that all AAUW members have the opportunity to derive maximum enjoyment when participating in activities and discussions. With that in mind, please help members with impairments such as hearing or vision have rewarding group experience,

participate fully and remain motivated to stay in your group. Here are some hints to help achieve this goal and to make meetings more effective for everyone.

1. Facilitator and members with impairments arrive at the room ahead of time to adjust seating arrangements.
2. Members with impairment take responsibility to adjust their seating and give feedback to other members so they so they can fully participate in the discussion. (If another member is talking softly ask her to speak up.)
3. Facilitator makes occasional stops in conversation to sum up and just hit the pause button for questions from everybody.
4. Facilitators remind all members to speak one at a time, clearly and allow time to process the information. Members work to speak one at a time.

Remember that the brain is working as hard as possible to process sensory inputs as well as ideas. Structured conversation, as in: question, opportunity for answers, pause before next question, summarized answers, etc. helps the brain catch up with the senses. In addition, that will increase the quality of the discussion experience for **all** group members.

Linda grew up in upstate NY and earned her BA and MA at Middlebury College with a major in German. She married Richard Harrison in 1965 and taught German in high school and college

level. She returned to college in the early 1980s to obtain her MSW at Syracuse University. She and Richard had two sons, Jeffrey and Steven. After moving to Prescott in 1999, she was active in the Open Door, the Smoki Museum, the Alzheimer's Association and several interest groups within AAUW.

Starting in high school, Linda sang in music groups, including the Prescott United Methodist Church and the Yavapai College Master Chorale. Ann Janecek remembers Linda as "...always upbeat and positive. She had a joyful spirit and we could easily break into song. She was a great and enthusiastic team member, willing to do whatever needed doing. She could be quite funny, with a good sense of humor. And she was always kind. I miss the twinkle in her eye, her happy smile and her ready hug. When I think of Linda, I smile and remember singing opera in the street after a performance."

Joan Tupper Fleming

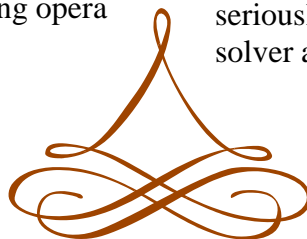

Widowed in 1982, she retired to Prescott in the late 80s but did not slow down. Joan began her 19th year as a governing board member of the Prescott Unified School District, serving as its president for five separate terms.

She loved her kids, her grandchildren and her dogs and was a loyal friend to many. Although she always looked polished as if she stepped from the pages of a glossy magazine, and had many accomplishments, she did not take herself too seriously. Joan was a fun loving, practical problem solver and an inspiration to all.

New Coffee Service for General Meetings

Some of you may have noticed that *Sodexo*, the catering service used at Yavapai College, provided our beverages at our April meeting. Setting up the coffee and tea service is a huge and time-consuming task, which includes:

- schlepping those large, heavy coffee pots and all the other components in and out of the meeting site;
- arriving at the meeting site at least an hour early to prepare the pots;
- staying after the meeting for cleaning up the pots;
- making trips to the store for supplies; and storing the pots and supplies until the next meeting (which entails bringing all of this in and out of someone's home each time).

We have chosen to use Sodexo for the convenience that the service provides our Hospitality Committee. Obviously, this comes with a small cost. The Board has agreed to provide one half of the costs, with the proviso that we coffee and tea drinkers chip in on the other half.
