Public Policy held their final meeting for 2012-2013 on May 7. Our topic for study was Cyber

Holli focused our group on steps that help implement healthy practices in our relationships with technology. She shared an example of a Family On line Safety Contract. Such contracts can help parents and children have a better working relationship regarding technology and on line safety.

Holli and several other AAUW Prescott members are involved in bringing an **Anti-Bullying Event to Prescott on August 29 and 30** of this year. The event will include a screening of the Bully Movie a presentation by Kirk Smalley of Stand for the Silent.

AAUW Convention

New Orleans is a great city for a convention. The

Sheraton Hotel was just two blocks from Bourbon Street and the French Ouarter. The energy level in the meeting was high and the 700 members in attendance took advantage of the over 50 workshops which ranged from the new logo, to fundraising to LAF (Legal Advocacy Fund) and Tech Trek and everything in between-- certainly something for everybody.

The general sessions were great as well. There was even a \$tart \$mart facilitator training as a pre-conference event and two showings of The Invisible War, the movie about sexual assault in the military. (That movie is available as a Program in a Box on the AAUW website.)

The panel discussion on **Equal Pay** was moderated by Linda Hallman, AAUW CEO. It was especially appropriate as this is the 50th anniversary of the first equal pay bill that was signed by President John F. Kennedy. The panelists were Lisa Maatz, AAUW VP of

government relations, Lilly Ledbetter, author and activist, and Keith T. Hill, head of the EEOC (Equal Employment Opportunity Commission)-New Orleans District office. The bill that is being lobbied by AAUW,

the Paycheck Fairness Act, would prohibit retaliation for sharing wage information. The EEOC is the enforcement arm of pay fairness. The various district offices have speakers available to educate the public on the laws.

Lilly Ledbetter is in the process of turning her pay struggles into a movie. She says "you need to know your rights, or you don't have any." So our focus should be on education: Discrimination is against the law. AAUW is preparing an LAF website to help us learn more. It will be out in a few months.

Robin Gerber, author, lawyer, leadership expert, spoke on "Leadership the Eleanor Roosevelt Way." Eleanor's childhood was grim; she was sent, alone, to a boarding school in London when she was 14. Her three years there had a huge impact on her life. Among other things, it taught her to get past fear, and the head of the school was an excellent role model for the rest of Eleanor's life. Ms. Gerber told us much about Eleanorknowledge she gained through the research for her two books about Eleanor Roosevelt.

In 1939, Eleanor resigned her membership in the DAR, because they wouldn't let Marian Anderson sing in their Washington concert hall. Ms. Anderson held her concert at the Lincoln Memorial. Eleanor didn't attend as she didn't want to be a distraction

As a delegate to the first UN meeting in 1948, Eleanor chaired the committee that wrote the Universal Declaration of Human Rights, which has a statement requiring equal pay for equal work, Article 23, paragraph 3. She also had a radio show called "Prospects for Mankind." Her first interview was with Martin Luther King. In many ways Eleanor Roosevelt lived a life teaching tolerance, and at the same time was much derided by those who hated her and her husband, Franklin Delano Roosevelt. AAUW has a film Teaching

> Tolerance available to member branches.

The workshop on branch fundraising focused on the legalities and the differences between 501(c)3 and 501(c)4 nonprofits. The IRS has been

looking closely at these organizations and how they handle their fund raising reporting. Branches should take a narrow view of "mission based" programs in order to remain in compliance with AAUW and the IRS.

Remember that if funds are not given directly to a 501(c) 3, they are not tax exempt for the donor. Look for a more complete article on this subject in a future newsletter.

Another interesting and valuable workshop was on programs. There was some discussion about **Programs** in a Box (PIAB) on the AAUW website. I recommend looking there for future branch activity ideas. There was also discussion about the (cont'd next page)

(cont'd) availability of free speakers from various sources: fellowship and grant recipients, LAF plaintiffs, EEOC offices, US attorney regional offices, and FBI to name a few. Some of the PIAB's need some advance planning. Particularly intriguing was "Speech Trek" – a speech competition for high school students.

Prescott AAUW will be working on gaining college and university partnerships with Yavapai College and Prescott College. The workshop on this topic was full of information about how to do this, the structure of the benefits on both sides of the partnership, and how to make it work for everybody. There are currently 850 partnerships, 73% at four-year colleges, the balance at two-year schools. These partnerships allow 4500 undergrads and 900 graduate students to have free membership in AAUW and to learn about what a wonderful organization we are.

And then there was the banquet! Of course that came at an additional cost, but it was an opportunity to get all dressed up in our finery. Opportunities are

so rare in Prescott! The theme was a celebration of 125 years of fellowships and grants.

The Eleanor Roosevelt Fund award went to Linda T.
Alepin of the Global
Women's Leadership
Network. This is an example of AAUW going international.
Ms. Alepin is board chair and founder of GWLN, an NGO that offers a residential leadership program which brings together women from multiple sectors, including

business, government, civil society organizations and academia. The end result is an international network of exceptional women, who are visionary leaders ready to transform their communities. Ms. Alepin is affiliated with Santa Clara University, and is a noted public speaker on leadership in the corporate arena.

Olympia Snow, recently retired from Congress, was honored with the **2013 AAUW Achievement Award**. She is only the fourth woman in history to be elected to both houses of Congress and the first woman in

American history to serve in both houses of a state legislature and both houses of Congress. She served on the Senate Finance Committee, the Senate Committee of

Small business and Entrepreneurship, and the Senate Intelligence Committee. She was instrumental in establishing the Office of Research on Women's Health

> at the National Institute of Health while she was in the House of Representatives. Ms. Snow was a moderate who focused on building bipartisanship on key issues.

The 2013 AAUW Alumnae Recognition Award went to Melissa-Harris Perry, who unfortunately, was unable to attend the event. We saw a short video by Ms. Harris-Perry thanking AAUW for the fellowship she received that allowed her to complete

her doctorate degree while she wrote her first book, <u>Barbershops</u>, <u>Bibles</u>, <u>and BET</u>. Her second book, <u>Sister Citizen</u> was quite well received. Ms. Harris Perry is a news commentator on MSNBC and a professor of political science at Tulane University. She also writes a monthly column called "Sister Citizen" for <u>The Nation</u> magazine
