

AAUW-Prescott's Community Action experiential event "The Reality Store" is coming up **Thursday, September 14 at 8:00 a.m. to around 1:00,** in collaboration with Yavapai College. It is targeted to girls and boys, 7th

grade and up through high school and college.

At The Reality Store[®], students select a career. They then learn the monthly salary of that job. Then they enter "The Reality Store" where they will spend their salary by making choices on housing, clothing, car, and much more, that they envision as part of their adult lifestyle. This event helps students learn the real cost of living and whether their occupation will provide the type of lifestyle they expect and want. If not, what could they do differently?

Many of you helped "man" the event previously and offered feedback for improvements, which we are implementing. On the evaluations, everyone said they really enjoyed interacting with the students!

We are calling out for your help again in September. "The Reality Store" is Thursday, **September 14 at 8:00 a.m. to around 1:00,** in the Yavapai College Community Room. Details will follow in an email to those who volunteer. Each of you will be specifically assigned to a task and briefed in advance

of what you need to do. We will also have a training hour at the Prescott Library a week before the event for those who have never worked this event in the past.

Women's Equality Day on August 26 is an annual observance that commemorates the anniversary of the first time **voting rights** were extended to women in the United States.

A Night of Terror Remembered



In 1917 (a hundred years ago) suffragists were imprisoned after picketing the White House.

They suffered violent attacks at

the Occoquan Workhouse in Virginia. They were members of the National Woman's Party; affidavits claim they were brutally beaten and abused. Lucy Burns was handcuffed and forced to hang from the top of her cell, while some witnesses say Dora Lewis suffered a heart attack. The abuse was ordered by the superintendent, W.H. Whittaker, in an attempt to teach the suffragists a lesson. The courage and conviction expressed by the National Woman's Party inspired more volunteers to join the picket line and eventually convince the public and

elected officials to support the suffrage amendment. Read more about this incident and the bravery of these women at the links below.
