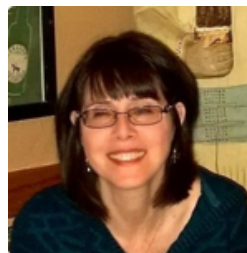

Public Policy News

Becky Gunn Reports on Several Events

The Public Policy Committee held its monthly meeting on February 6, 2018, at the Prescott Public Library with a small group in attendance. The topic for the meeting was the Equal Rights Amendment (ERA) which is being supported by the National and Arizona Branches of AAUW. The meeting, facilitated by Becky Gunn, gathered information from several



sources: National Council of Women's Organizations, the Blog for Arizona, the National Organization for Women, and AAUW. Discussions included the relevancy of the ERA in the 21st Century, the varying issues on which there is inequality for women, and the current process being pursued in the Arizona Legislature. This discussion was in part to prepare for the Arizona AAUW Legislature Day (Feb 20).

Arizona Legislative Day: Informative, Well Attended

Forty AAUW members attended Legislative Day on Feb 20 and declared that the day was a success. We met compatriots from other AAUW branches and listened to, exchanged ideas with, and asked questions of four different state representatives. The day focused in large part on the Equal Rights Amendment (ERA), but also on the processes of getting legislation to be considered and then passed.



The morning began with Representative Becky Nutt from LD14, substituting for Speaker of the House Mesnard who was unable to attend due to a scheduling conflict. Rep. Nutt emphasized STEM and educational issues along with issues concerning water availability. She did not address the ERA issue with which we are so concerned.

The second speaker was Representative Hanley, a Democrat from the Tucson area, who has introduced the ERA for legislative consideration for the past two years. She emphasized the necessity for the ERA and

the frustration of proponents of that amendment due to the unwillingness of Judiciary Committee Chair, Rep. Farnsworth, to hold hearings on the submitted bills.

The third speaker was Michelle Ugenti-Rita, a Republican Representative from District 23. She also submitted a bill to support the ERA. She, too, is frustrated that her bill has not been heard in committee. Representative Ugenti-Rita is passionate about the ERA because she is for “fairness and equity. It is a human issue, not a partisan issue.” She researched the issues associated with the ERA and believes if all legislators did the same, many others would be supportive of the Amendment. She proposed that women need to work together, but also need to listen to others’ concerns and issues. It is only by engaging our legislators in dialogue that we will be able to move the ERA forward.

The fourth speaker was Representative Athena Salman, Democrat from LD 26, the youngest legislator in the House. She is part of the class of 2017 where women hold 40% of the offices in the House. Rep. Salman is a remarkably articulate, passionate, issues-oriented woman. She is definitely pro-woman which means she supports the ERA, but is also involved in other legislation relating to women. She submitted a bill this year to ensure that incarcerated women would have adequate sanitary supplies. While the bill was not passed, by proposing the bill she moved the correctional system to change their policy. She is a model for young legislators and was inspiring to all of us attending. She is a strong voice for the power of women.

Those attending from Prescott were Deb Dillon, Becky Gunn, Lynne Murphy, Sue Marceau, Patti Allen-LaFleur, and Janet Herbert. Each participant expressed that the day was well worth the time and drive and would encourage more participation at next year’s Legislative Day.

Upcoming Public Policy Meetings

The **March 6th** meeting will include a presentation on reproductive justice by the area coordinator for Planned Parenthood, Desiree Perez. The **April 3rd** meeting will focus on STEM education. In addition to a report from those who worked during STEM days at Embry Riddle, Andy Fraher, the STEM Outreach Director at Embry Riddle, will give an update on STEM activities at that university.

The Committee **will not be holding a May meeting** due to the conflict with the Sister-to-Sister event.

New Coffee Welcomes Six Newcomers

On February 3rd, The AAUW Board hosted the bi-annual New Member Gathering at Betsy Peek’s home. The six new members who participated shared how they came to live in Prescott, as well as information about their backgrounds, education, and careers. AAUW-Prescott Volunteers at ERAU's Girls Rock-It Day

On February 6, 2018, eight members of our Prescott branch were privileged to assist with Girls' Rock-It Day at Embry-Riddle Aeronautical University.



The day included breakout sections that focused on Aviation, Engineering, Global Interest, and Physical Sciences. The University utilized their professors to offer hands-on workshops for small groups of girls from middle and high schools in our quad-city area. Forty young women were signed up for the February event, and there are 40 more young women signed up for the next event, with a similar format, which will be held on March 6, 2018.

Our Prescott branch applied for and received a grant from AAUW Arizona for \$200 for each of the two keynote speakers we were fortunate enough to line up. Our February speaker was Elizabeth Peters, an instructor at Yavapai Community College. She related that she grew up in the area, attended Yavapai Community College, and worked in Electrical and Instrumentation Technology before she returned to teach in this subject area.

Our speaker for the March 6th Rock-It Day will be Dr. Sian Proctor, a geoscience professor at South Mountain Community College in Phoenix. An accomplished scientist, Dr. Proctor is sure to impress the young women with an amazing array of science activities of which she has been part.

This has been a great opportunity to collaborate with an esteemed local institution to help promote STEM study possibilities to local young women. Thank you for the support from our Prescott AAUW Branch.

4. Present the information to the Board for approval and the information will be included in the master calendar, and on our web site. The board member responsible for being liaison is the President-Elect.

AAUW-Prescott History

**AAUW and Yavapai College:
Partners Uplifting a
Community**

A continuously evolving partnership between Yavapai College and Prescott's AAUW was formed early in 2000 when Mary Alice Moulton and other representatives of AAUW attended a YC Governing Board meeting



and urged the development of a family enrichment center. They continued to attend these meetings, lobby District I legislators, and participate in a task force on child care until the Del E. Webb Family Enrichment Center became a reality. In 2005 AAUW entered into an agreement with the college to endow the Mary Alice Moulton Childcare Fund, providing support to children of mothers attending classes on campus.

Also in 2005 we launched the Sister-to-Sister mentoring program with YC partner, ETS, a federally funded program targeting first-generation students in grades 6-12. Our events were held in a variety of venues until Yavapai College opened the Community Room on campus, which became our permanent home. Through our luncheon programs we have encouraged hundreds of young women to continue their education beyond high school.

In 2007 we initiated a second mentoring program. Thirty AAUW members joined faculty and staff from Yavapai College for a training session. For ten years our team of mentors provided encouragement to women returning to college. With the advent of on-line classes, the target population for this endeavor has become inaccessible to our team. The future of the program seems uncertain.

In recognition of Arizona's Centennial, AAUW began a new endowment: the Centennial Scholarship. This award targets second semester women in STEM fields on the Yavapai Campus. Fundraising for these two initiatives is an ongoing

endeavor as our branch seeks to provide support to an increasing number of Yavapai College students.

Other branch efforts in partnership with Yavapai College have

included Teen Maze (a county-wide effort encouraging youth to make good choices), the Dreams to Reality and Career Fair, Tech Savvy, and the mentors Traveling Team. Several of

our members serve on college committees, including the Family Enrichment Center. Our written support for federal grants is also sought. As YC President Penny Wills has said: "We are so fortunate to have the support of AAUW."

Most recently our branch members have participated in the summer LEAD program on both the Prescott and

Verde campuses of Yavapai College. When our branch wrote in support of an AAUW national grant to encourage women students entering college, we also agreed to participate in the summer orientation program as mentors.

Although the grant expired this past year, the college will extend the program and anticipates the continued support of AAUW mentors.

It is easy to see why the Prescott branch stands out among state AAUW branches. Its relationship with Yavapai College is unique. We are partners committed to uplifting our community.
