Let's show our Phoenician "sisters" Prescott's hometown spirit, marching side-by-side in support of the Equal Rights Amendment (ERA) Saturday, July 6. ERA Task Force Arizona has invited AAUW-Prescott and other local ERA supporters to join them in the annual Prescott Rodeo Days Parade. Details are being

"nalized, but marchers likely will dress in white and wear the purple and green "Equal Rights for Women" sashes (which will be provided). A large banner will introduce the marching unit, and the ERA text will be read when the group passes the judges' stand. The parade begins at 9 am, but the units will be required to assemble earlier. We are awaiting word from the parade organizers regarding time and assembly point. Please email publicpolicy@aauw.prescott.net to join us.

Lessons learned from school systems in Finland were shared at the May Public Policy Committee (PPC) meeting by Clark Tenney, recent Fulbright Scholar and assistant vice principal at Prescott High School. Tenney described the high esteem in which teachers are held in Finland, explaining that collegeage students can be accepted more easily into degree programs to become doctors or lawyers. He also identi"ed seven ways education in Prescott could be enhanced by mirroring Finland's emphasis on goals at every grade level and subjects to emphasize: 1) Thinking and learning to learn; 2) Cultural competence, interaction, and self- expression; 3) Taking care of oneself and managing daily life; 4) Multilingualism and multi-literacy; 5) Competence in the use of technology; 6) Working life competence and entrepreneurship, and 7) Involvement in building a sustainable future. The PPC anticipates assisting in local implementation.

30, urging the audience to "Follow the Money: Charter Schools – Public/Private Funding." Charter school o#cials contend that the taxpayer funding they receive becomes private money when it hits the charters' pockets and their boards. Charters receive \$7,309 per pupil from state taxpayers compared to \$3,972 per student to public schools, Hall stated.
