The City of Flagstaff's Climate and Adaptation Plan—Sep 12



The Honorable Coral Evans, the Mayor of Flagstaff, will be presenting the City of Flagstaff's Climate and Adaptation plan. "The Plan recognizes the value of the community, the thriving economy, the neighborhoods, and the people. To protect what we love about Flagstaff, we need

to ensure that we are prepared for change. The benefits of planning ahead are innumerable: we see that value through forest treatments that help us avoid catastrophic wildfire and flooding, as well as through investments in services that keep our vulnerable community members safe. This Plan was made by and for the Flagstaff community. Hundreds of residents contributed through open houses, online surveys, and coffee and climate conversations."

Mayor Coral Evans was elected in November 2016. Although new to the position of Mayor, Ms. Evans was not new to the Flagstaff City Council. She was first elected to serve on the Flagstaff City Council in 2008 and reelected in 2012. She served as Vice Mayor of the City from 2012-2014. She is the third generation of her family to live in Flagstaff. Her family, the Dorsey's, have been an active part of the Flagstaff and the greater Northern Arizona community since the early 1900s. In addition to serving on the Council, Ms. Evans is the Executive Director of a nonprofit organization, Sunnyside Neighborhood Association of Flagstaff, Inc., and is a small business owner, Destiney's Creations.

Public Policy

Understanding Public Money for School Choice

As our Public Policy Committee promotes dedicated, equitable and adequate funding for public education in Arizona, we continue to build our understanding of public money for

school choice.

First, more per-student funding is distributed by the state to charter schools than to district schools. This is designed in part to compensate charters for their exclusion from the bond override system that district schools often forfeit anyway from voter resistance.

Furthermore, public funding is available for students who enroll in private, home, or micro school options. Two distinct avenues are **School Tuition Organizations (STOs)** and **Empowerment Scholarship Accounts (ESAs)**.

STOs give funds to families with private school or home schooled children by covering a portion of the expense of attendance, with the balance paid by parents. The source of these funds is tax credits provided to individuals or companies in lieu of state income tax liabilities.

In the Empowerment Scholarship Account (ESA) Program, the Arizona Department of Education assesses a student's financial need and issues a voucher of between \$6,000 and \$40,000 for one year. The average allocation to a student is \$12,000 per year.

ESAs are used by home school families for services, such as teaching aides and online programs. Micro schools were recently launched in homes for small groups of students, using "guides" as opposed to teachers, so that students are eligible for ESA funding to fully cover the expense of attending.



Beyond the inequitable distribution of public funding across many school choice options, there also is inequality in student access to these options. Based on research conducted by Save Our Schools Arizona, 20 years of school choice shows that white and Asian students are overrepresented. Latinos, who comprise nearly half of Arizona's students (for example), only account for one-third of charter and private school pupils.

As the general election approaches, we have an opportunity to review candidates' education platforms, including their views on school choice, and cast our votes accordingly.
