May 8th General Meeting

Climate Impact: How Women Will Lead Us to a More Sustainable Future

Dr. Frances Julia Riemer will explore and discuss the many issues of social justice and gender inequity in a changing climate. This will include examining the higher risks and greater burdens on women from the impacts of climate change and the ways in which unequal participation in decision-making processes and labor markets compound these effects and prevent women from fully contributing to climate-related planning, policy-making, and implementation.

**Dr. Frances Julia Riemer** is an educational anthropologist, feminist, and self-described traveler extraordinaire. She has worked and traveled in the US, Europe, East and Southern Africa, the Middle East, Southeast Asia, and Latin America alone, as part of a team, a couple, a nuclear, and an extended family. Her ethnographic research focuses on change and issues of equity and access, gender, development and sustainable communities, women's crafts and tourism, and cultural difference and the social organization of community, school, and workplace. Dr. Riemer is a Fulbright scholar, and her work has been supported by the Spencer Foundation and the National Academy of Education. She organizes for progressive policies locally and nationally, and speaks on Women's Suffrage, the ERA, and Gender and Climate Change. She is a Professor of Educational



Foundations and Associate Faculty, former Director of Women's and Gender Studies Program at Northern Arizona University.

### **Future Programs**

#### Developing the Programs for 2021-2022 is Underway

In February and March members were asked to respond to a list of possible program topics for the 2021-2022 year. Fifty-three people participated in the poll, and fifteen topics received twenty or more positive responses. Current planning calls for program speakers to be able to present either on Zoom or in person, depending on what happens with COVID-19 and its variants.

The broad categories gathering the most interest, but not listed in any order were: Native American issues; climate and environment; women's health; poverty/homelessness/hunger; immigration; racism and minority issues; building community and civil society in politically divided times; gun violence; disaster and emergency preparedness.

After the "Unladylike" video and announcements, the Communications Team divided the members into 5 breakout rooms on Zoom. Board members facilitated the discussions about our strengths and weaknesses, and ideas to make AAUW more responsive to the needs and interests of our members. The board and program committee will be discussing how to address these issues in coming meetings. Thirty-seven members and three guests attended.

**Communications:** All five groups were very positive about the quality, frequency, and timeliness of communications. The Communications Team received high praise for Zoom and the inclusiveness and continuity it brought to our group in general meetings, committee meetings, and interest group gatherings.

**Leadership:** To recruit leaders we need to do a better job of promoting the positions and what they entail. Interest groups need to be reminded that the leadership of the group may change at any time.

Member recruitment, retention and inclusiveness: We need to try to recruit members with a wider variety of viewpoints and demographics. A committee of greeters should meet new members/guests at the door and introduce them to other members. The president-elect should call all new members, discuss their interests, and help them contact interest group and committee leaders. Each Interest group leader should contact any new member who has indicated interest in that group. We should have fun, outdoor events or meetings for current and new members with fun being the primary motivation.

**Scholarships and fundraising:** One group indicated that two events per year was enough. Another suggested a once-a-year request for scholarship donations. Praise was expressed for our relationship with Yavapai College.

**Programs Topics:** (additional suggestions duplicated poll responses) Community building and civil discourse, Americans with Disabilities Act, Human Trafficking; Safety at outdoor activities, Search and Rescue, Emergency and Disaster Preparedness.

New interest groups suggested: AAUW chorus, "Unladylike" women in history or similar.

Comments pertaining to programs, mission, etc.: There is interest in having some programs that include activities, break-out sessions, and suggestions of how to respond to community needs. Increase AAUW community involvement and recognition. Community outreach or service that includes elements like co-sponsoring events.

## **Public Policy**

As a Public Policy Committee, we focus primarily on promoting dedicated, equitable and adequate funding for public education in Arizona. As we reach the end of the 2020-21 school year, members of AAUW-Prescott might consider making donations to benefit students in two of our local school districts: Humboldt Unified School District (HUSD) and Prescott Unified School District (PUSD).

Lisa Krietenstein, the Family Resource Specialist and Homeless Coordinator for the HUSD Family Resource Center (FRC), provides support to district families. The FRC offers free clothing and school supplies to HUSD students who qualify for and are registered under the federal McKinney-Vento Homeless Assistance Act. Clothing donations such as coats, gloves and jeans are welcome. The FRC staff also refers families to agencies that offer assistance with rent and/or utilities and supplies information about low income

Arizona ranks sixth in the country for the most personal money spent by teachers on school supplies for their students, according to a recent survey released by the National Center for Education Statistics. Recognizing this tremendous cash outlay, totaling an average of \$655 spent annually by state teachers for classroom supplies, the PUSD Education Foundation opened its School Supply Closet. Jane Robertson, a member of the PUSD Education Foundation Board and a retired teacher from Abia Judd Elementary School, spearheads this effort. With the economic impact of COVID-19, many more families are suffering financially. The foundation provides school supplies to teachers so that they do not spend their personal money purchasing school supplies for the many children in their classes who cannot afford them.
