


NEW STATE DIVISION OFFICERS



JERRI WAGNER — The first elected woman mayor in Arizona. She served on the City Council for two terms and served as the international and national president of the General Federation on Women's Clubs.



- **(4)** A community action grant project related to education and equity for women and girls, including a diversity component;
- (5) Sustained public policy advocacy;
- **(6)** Visibility in the community based on either a community action project or public policy;
- (7) Leadership development.
